The number of students who were honored at EMCC's National Technical Honor Society on Wednesday, May 22, 2013.



# Technology Tip of the Week


#### **Recent Documents**

Office 2010 has a feature called the "Backstage View". To get to it, click on the **File** ribbon. You have probably been using this for Save, Save As, New, Open, and Print features. This feature allows you to keep your most used documents on the top of the "**Recent Documents**" list. To do this, click on the "**Push Pin**" (circled) next to the document. The pin will change from a clear side view to a blue pushed in view. Documents with the blue pin will stay above the grey dashed line at the top of the list. To remove them just click on the blue pin to "un-pin".

In the column to the right of "Recent Documents", is "Recent Places". You can also "Pin" the file folders that you use frequently. This is really handy when you use folders that have very long folder names (paths).

This tip also works in Excel and PowerPoint. Suggested uses include: Mileage worksheet, meeting agendas, or any blank form that you use repeatedly.







# **Programs & Services Update**

#### Lois E. Bird/Morgan School

The library committee at Lois E. Bird/Morgan School collaborated with Science Instructional Specialist Maryann Quirk to follow up the Science themed book fair with a day dedicated to Science and Literacy. On May 13<sup>th</sup>, students at Lois E. Bird Morgan School participated in 'Laboratory Detective Day.' The Instructional Specialist team as well as Aimee Johnson (Science teacher from START/ALA) facilitated stations that were Science themed with a strong connection to Literacy. Students were engaged in activities that exposed them to concepts in Living, Earth, and Physical Science. Students made Barbie bungee jump, were involved in color mixing, and experienced worms and volcanos. They participated in an obstacle course mimicking migration



obstacles as well as created oobleck and gak. The library committee brought in the DEC petting zoo and students had a wonderful time interacting with the animals. The students were so excited to be involved in hands-on activities, activating prior knowledge and making connections to Science! This collaboration facilitated a unique learning experience for the students, one to be replicated and continued in the classroom with inquiry based science lessons that are integrated to all the content areas.
