
Technology Tip of the Week


Start Page Numbering on a Page 2

In long Word documents sometimes your first pages may be title pages or table of contents. You don't want to include them in the section of the document with Page Numbers. Here is how to control that.

1. Go to the **Insert** ribbon and click on **Footer**. At bottom of dropdown page, click on **Edit Footer**.



2. Check the box next to **Different First Page**.
3. Put the cursor in page 2 Footer and insert a page number.
4. On ribbon, under Page Number, click on **Bottom of Page** and select a style.
5. Go back to Page Number on ribbon and Click on **Format Page Numbers**.
6. In the Page Numbering section, click "**Start At**" and enter **0** (zero).




This will make the actual second page **Page number 1**...allowing the first page to be a title page.

Programs & Services Update

Students Get Hands-on with Careers of the Future!

On Thursday, April 16th, over 100 tenth and eleventh grade students from local schools explored eight workforce areas (as identified by the WIRED Initiative and forecasted to be future growth industries) at the 9th Annual Youth Workforce at RIT's Student Innovations Hall. The conference provides a unique forum for high school students to explore potential career fields through hands-on activities led by faculty and staff at RIT.

The keynote speaker, Jennifer Indovina, a clean tech entrepreneur, political energy advisor, and TED Fellow, is currently working to spread energy efficiency initiatives worldwide. Jennifer is the CEO and Co-



Founder of Tenrehte Technologies, Inc. a clean tech company that produces wireless consumer electronics products. Tenrehte's first product is the PICOwatt™ Smart Plug, an energy saving outlet adapter that gives you remote control over the power your devices consume. The PICOwatt™ Smart Plug has received international recognition, winning the 2010 Best of CES Green Product Award, as well as being featured in the New York Times, Popular Science Magazine, Treehugger.com, and BusinessWeek. Jen's latest TED talk: Eliminating Power Poverty can be viewed on YouTube.

Following the keynote presentation, students were escorted by RIT tour guides in small groups to specific workshop areas. Each student was required to preselect two specific workforce areas to attend from the choice of eight workforce areas, including: Biomedical Sciences, Biotechnology and Molecular Bioscience, Computing Security, Electrical and Computer Engineering Technology, Hospitality and Tourism Management, Information Sciences and Technologies, Media Arts & Technology, and Microelectronic Engineering & Nanotechnology. The students touring the Media Arts & Technology presentation learned about potential career areas from Program Chair, Michael Riordan. Riordan explained how the Media Arts & Technology degree can lead to careers in advertising design, science (applied), business, communications, engineering, or publishing. In each workshop, students heard similar suggestions regarding pathways of study in the various fields and the types of jobs available in the near future.

The Youth Workforce Innovations Conference is coordinated by Monroe #1 BOCES through the "College and Career Ready" Partnership program, coordinated by JoAnne Jones. RIT K-12 hosted the conference and provided lunch for the students.
